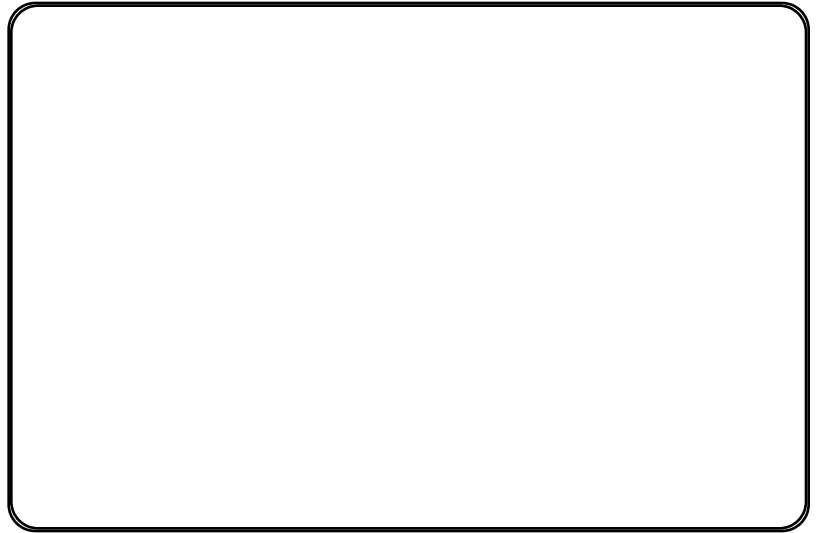
1. Rewrite this quotation in your own words.

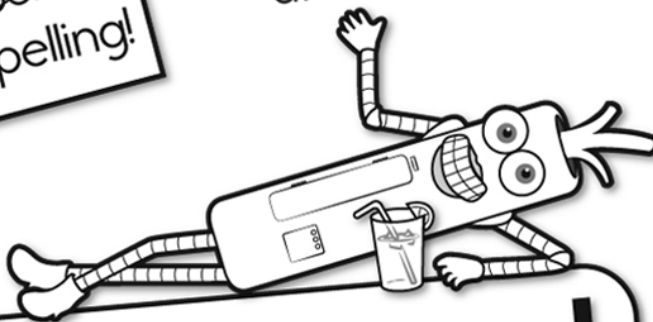


Mary and Sarah ran a race. Mary came in fiftieth place. Sarah was five runners after Mary. Write the ordinal number for the place that Sarah came in.

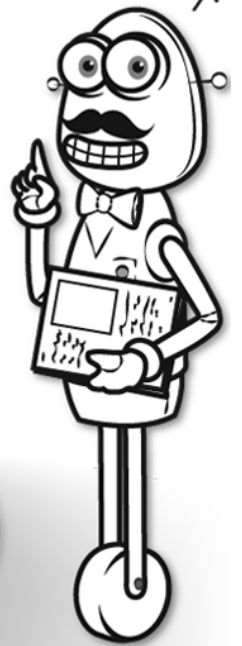
